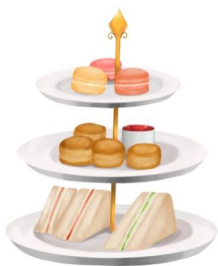
The new members are: Krista O, Berene C, Barbara P and Cheryl S. Please reach out to them and make them feel welcome.

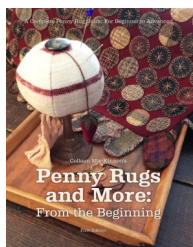
PROGRAMS

While I was being helped by one of the tellers, another teller recognized our Guild's name and rushed over to me, bubbling with excitement. Her story was so heartfelt that it brought tears to my eyes, and I hope I can do it justice.

She shared with me that her mother had been in the Lions Gate Hospice, and it sounded like they had been there before. She told me how our quilts on the patients' beds brought such a refreshing warmth to the otherwise sterile and cold environment. She said that it was so much more than just physical warmth; those quilts truly lifted spirits and brought a sense of joy and comfort to the patients and their families. She described how the bright colors of our quilts brightened up the rooms, and when patients wrapped themselves in them, they could feel the love that went into making each quilt. She said that it was as if this love wrapped around them, providing comfort when they needed it the most.

By the end of our chat, we were both a little teary-eyed. We tried hard not to get too emotional, but the joy we felt was truly special—one that only an act of kindness can create. Every stitch you all put into our Community Quilts is appreciated more than you can imagine, and this lovely bank teller wanted to send her heartfelt thanks to every one of you for your love and support.

I also want to shout out a big thank you to our amazing ladies in Community Quilts who do the hard work of knowing exactly where and when our quilts are needed most. You're all truly wonderful!
